Participants explore relationship management frameworks, interpersonal communication protocols, and cost-conscious tracking tools to turn organizational objectives into measurable results. - Practical exercise: Stakeholder communication simulation under evolving constraints

Day 3: Leadership Dynamics and Team Motivation

- Situational leadership approaches for multi-stakeholder project environments
- Task delegation, ownership distribution, and shared accountability structures
- Motivation models for technical, administrative, and cross-functional teams
- Emotional intelligence applications for project leadership and conflict prevention
- Transparency mechanisms that build long-term commitment and morale
- Coordination strategies for hybrid, dispersed, and remote project contributors
- Practical exercise: Leadership scenario role-play and motivational assessment

Day 4: Conflict Management and Principled Negotiation

- Root cause analysis of interdepartmental friction and resource contention
- Principled negotiation techniques focusing on mutual interests rather than positions
- De-escalation pathways for contentious project governance meetings
- Mediation strategies to preserve vendor, client, and team relationships
- Managing passive and active resistance during technical transitions
- Rebuilding project momentum and alignment following contractual or operational disputes
- Practical exercise: Structured negotiation role-play over contested project deliverables



Day 5: Stakeholder Influence Mapping and Relationship Governance

- Advanced power-interest grid modeling and stakeholder saliency analysis
- Upward management techniques for executive sponsors and steering committees
- Lateral relationship building across competing functional departments
- Designing dynamic engagement plans for volatile and high-risk environments
- Utilizing stakeholder feedback loops to adjust scope and schedule baselines
- Governance review checkpoints for auditing stakeholder satisfaction
- Practical exercise: Constructing an influence mapping matrix for complex project ecosystems

Day 6: Strategic Communication and Change Enablement

- Communicating organizational change impacts through structured narrative frameworks
- Balancing project status transparency with sensitivity to organizational priorities
- Overcoming operational inertia and addressing adoption reluctance
- Engaging mid-level managers as change advocates and communication champions
- Aligning project milestone updates with broader corporate strategic messaging
- Integrating change communication milestones into formal project baselines
- Practical exercise: Drafting a change readiness and communication plan for process transformation

Day 7: Cross-Functional Departmental Collaboration

- Bridging communication gaps between technical teams and non-technical stakeholders
- Establishing shared operational definitions and common key performance indicators
- Facilitating cross-functional problem-solving workshops and design reviews
- Managing dependencies and resource scheduling across shared departmental pools
- Leveraging digital collaboration platforms for visible workflow tracking
- Conducting cross-functional interface reviews to minimize handover errors
- Practical exercise: Cross-departmental coordination case study and dependency resolution

Day 8: Sustaining Engagement and High Team Performance

- Diagnosing project fatigue, burnout, and declining motivation during long execution cycles
- Recognition and incentive systems aligned with milestone completions
- Maintaining team accountability through regular operational stand-ups
- Structured lessons-learned methodologies for mid-project process adaptation
- Capturing operational knowledge to prevent recurrence of systemic project delays
- Institutionalizing continuous feedback to refine collaborative practices
- Practical exercise: Developing an operational retention and recognition framework

Day 9: Project Management Systems and Lifecycle Integration

- Core project lifecycle phases: initiating, planning, executing, monitoring, and closing
- Integrating stakeholder registers into the formal project management plan
- Scope baseline definition, Work Breakdown Structure creation, and schedule logic
- Risk management matrices and qualitative probability-impact evaluations
- Quality control checkpoints and acceptance verification procedures
- Deploying progress dashboards for executive stakeholder transparency
- Practical exercise: Mapping stakeholder checkpoints across the Work Breakdown Structure

Day 10: Cost Models, Earned Value, and Value Delivery

- Project cost baseline formulation, direct cost estimation, and contingency reserves
- Cost forecasting models and cash flow planning during project execution
- Variance analysis using Planned Value, Earned Value, and Actual Cost
- Calculating Schedule Performance Index and Cost Performance Index
- Balancing financial expenditure controls with client satisfaction and scope delivery
- Translating cost efficiency data into clear executive performance summaries
- Practical exercise: Capstone simulation linking stakeholder negotiation, cost variance analysis, and recovery planning
